






Child Welfare System SFY 2007 Data Cook North




Child Welfare System SFY 2007 Data Cook Central





Children in Substitute Care




Permanence by 12 Months

















Summary Summary

In Cook County, African American children make up **32**% of the child population yet they make up:

- o 55% of the indicated reports
- o 74% of entries into foster care

At each step into substitute care, disparity increases

In addition, African American children are reunited with their families at half the rate of White children (1 year).

Once in care, African American children stay longer than other children



Conclusion

National research shows that White families are just as likely to abuse their children as African American families but are far less likely to be reported to child welfare departments.

Research in Illinois shows that the biggest disparity exists at the point of reporting maltreatment, and is amplified at each subsequent point of contact with the child welfare system.

Research in Illinois also tells us that African American children are less likely to attain permanence, and that this disparity is greater in Cook than in the other regions of the state. This is particularly true for reunification.
